## **Reception**






This week we are learning all about Goldilocks and the Three Bears. We have had lots of discussions about who was in the right or wrong! We also made bear ears to wear whilst acting out the story – focusing on mixing the colour brown.

On Shrove Tuesday, we learnt all about why 'Pancake Day' is celebrated and who celebrates it. We read Mr Wolf's pancakes and helped him by writing him a shopping list! We mixed batter following a recipe and added our favourite toppings to pancakes to eat. Yum!

The children (and adults) were so excited to go on our school trip to Stockwood Discovery Centre- they could not believe we were out of school and not doing lessons for the whole day! The Year 1 adults were blown away to see the children showing this week's visible value of respect at the museum. They were showing this value by carefully touching the fragile carriages in the museum, tidying up after themselves and respecting that some artefacts they were not allowed to touch.

Our favourite thing about the trip was walking around the beautiful gardens. Although I am sure if you ask your child what they enjoyed most about our trip they would say















Year 2 have had a busy start to the term with our stunning start for our new theme 'Food Glorious Food' where we will be learning all about staying healthy. In our stunning start we researched, designed and made our own smoothies using our favourite fruits.

In English, we have been focusing on Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and we have had to put our character description skills to the test when there was an Oompa Loompa invasion within the school. The children worked as detectives to discover who had broken in to the school by following a range of clues which included pictures, chocolate wrappers and orange peels.

Ella even found the Oompa Loompa's skin!

The children have also been working hard to improve the appearance of the school by planting trees in our Forest School. Here is a photo of Olivia and Alice showing great team work.

In English, this term, the children have been learning about three forms of poetry. They have been learning about the poet, Joseph Coelho and experimenting with Abecedarius, MORERAPS and sonnets. In each form of poem, the children have learned how to use metaphors, similes, onomatopoeia and personification to bring their poetry about natural disasters to life. After half-term, Year 3 started a new text, Escape from Pompeii by Christina Balit. This is a beautifully illustrated book by the author and tells the story of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius at Pompeii through the eyes of two children, Tranio and Livia. We will be using this text to develop children's writing for character, setting description and drama and building to writing an adventure story.


At the end of last half-term, the children completed their rocks unit of work in science. They learned about the effects of erosion, explored different soil types and considered the properties of different rocks and their uses. Finally, they became fossil hunters, classified different fossil types using real-world examples and sequenced the process of fossilisation using a storyboard. A big thank you to those children, who kindly brought in fossils from home to share with the children. Year 3 have now started learning about forces. They have explored push, pull and twist forces and they have started to learn how objects can be moved from a push from the air. They will move on to learn about magnetism. where they will explore polarity and forces that can repel and attract.

In maths, we have revisited addition and subtraction by looking at strategies to answer missing number problems as well as the inverse relationship to check their answers. The children developed their confidence in calculation through their understanding of relationships between numbers in an equation. Moving on to Time, the children found it challenging to tell the time using an analogue clock, however, they persevered and developed their understanding of the language and strategies to tell the time accurately to the nearest minute.

During this term, we welcomed visitors from 'Who is Bedford?' as they introduced the children to a new way of teaching and learning history. During this highly engaging, interactive session, the children thoroughly enjoyed following instructions through their headphones. They immersed themselves in learning about the vast amount of people who immigrated to Bedford to seek work in the brickmaking industry as well as the wide range of religions and cultures that are celebrated in Bedford.

Finally, it has been wonderful for the children to now have the opportunity to learn how to swim this term. We have seen examples of bravery, kindness and resilience as they overcame their initial fears and supported one another. We look forward to seeing them progress over the coming weeks.







WORLD BOOK DAY



This half term, Year 4 have continued to learn about the Romans, linking this in with Italy. They have considered the differences and similarities between where the Romans came from and Britain, as well as locating different parts of Italy on a map. In Art, they have started to design their own Roman coil pots, thinking about what they would have been used for and trying to replicate some of the designs.

Last Thursday, Year 4 took a very exciting trip to the Verulamium museum in St Albans as part of their learning about the Romans. When they arrived, they had the opportunity to look around the museum, take part in a workshop all about Roman markets, and look at a real mosaic floor which had been uncovered. The market workshop involved the children dressing up in togas and exploring some of the different items that would have been on sale. They were able to handle replica artefacts and discuss what they would have been used for. In the museum, there were a variety of different artefacts on display that children were tasked with finding. They were amazed that so many had survived almost 2000 years!

Another great term as year 5 head towards Easter. The time is going very quickly and the children have been very fortunate to have had many exciting extra-curricular activities, such as young voices and creating music on Garageband.

In English the children have been writing instructions, as we looked at imperative verbs, temporal conjunctions and how to use bullet points accurately.

However, best of all, we will be making our own Viking Long boats.

While today, just for a bit of fun, we wrote a diary entry, as though we were Vikings, travelling over the North Sea.

In Maths, we have been covering the topic of position and direction, learned how to translate and reflect shapes and understand coordinates in 4 quadrants

In science, we will be learning about the properties and changes of materials, as we discover everyday materials and their properties, including their hardness, solubility, transparency, conductivity and response to magnets.



Every Wednesday, we are having iPad lessons, where the children will be using the GarageBand App to create their own music. The App is free to download, if anyone wants to try at home.

In art we will be exploring Scandinavian art, starting with how patterns are made using natural materials, going on to looking at Scandinavian artists.







#### Mayan masks

In DT, children have been showing perseverance to create Mayan masks over a number of sessions. The process has included creating a prototype and practicing different ways to join mate-

rials. Children have then designed their own mask and made this using 'modroc'. It was fantastic to see pupils demonstrating high levels of concentration to paint these carefully.

#### Vocabulary detectives!

As part of our reading curriculum, we have been looking closely at vocabulary in a variety of different texts. We have been using strategies for understanding unknown words. The children are becoming proficient in:



- using highlighter pens to identify unfamiliar words as we are reading a new text,
- reading the sentences before and after the word to learn the context,
- thinking of possible synonyms and then 'trying them' in the place of the existing unknown word,
- choosing a synonym that they believe is closely matched in its meaning,
- using dictionary to check meaning,
- using a thesaurus to check suitability of synonyms.

#### Who is Bedford?

In the last week of term, we took part in a cultural enrichment session, created by Full House Theatre in partnership with The Higgins Bedford. Children explored the heritage of Bedford and the people who live here, celebrating everything that makes Bedford the vibrant town it is to-day. Using interactive audio technology, this experience gave opportunities for learning across the curriculum from drama, citizenship and PS

#### Arithmetic and mental strategies

Using assessment of the children's existing knowledge in arithmetic, we have focused on specific areas of arithmetic that children have found challenging. This week it has been division! We have been using 'Fast maths' each day to practice rapid recall of multiplication and division facts. Ask your child for their top score this week!

#### **Recount writing**

At the end of last half term, we finished our unit of English work by writing a recount in the form of a letter between two characters from our class reader, Kaspar – Prince of Cats. Children took real pride in editing and writing a final draft – they are looking forward to showing you in our fabulous finish session in the last week of term.
